John was ahead of his time in the aspirations he had for all his students, to be caring, inclusive, bicultural New Zealanders. He adopted the motto 'We Care' and he showed this in all his decision making.



John Ryan, our founding principal, passed away on Monday 9th June. As a school we are saddened by this news as John has continued to support the school since his retirement in 1988. When he was able to, he would come in to school for school events, notably for prizegivings, powhiri and when we planted the first trees and shrubs in the Ngahere. We send our condolences to his family. Tamatea High School will miss him.

As we reach the midway point of the year, it's a good time to reflect on the energy, growth, and resilience we've seen throughout term two here at Tamatea High School.

Our value of kia tū angitu – excellence has been clear in so many places this term. From student-led events, like Pink Shirt Day, to the effort and creativity shown in the BP Business Challenge, our ākonga have really leaned into the opportunities in front of them. We've also had students representing the kura with pride at events like the East Coast North Island Athletics Championships, the Kapa Haka Regionals, and the Hawke's Bay Chess Tournament. Kai pai rawa atu!

We're pleased to welcome three new staff members to our kura this term. Arishma Singh has joined us in the Mathematics department after moving from Fiji. Amy Page joins our English department and is already making a positive impact with her enthusiasm for language and learning. We also welcome former student, Boston Malaitai as a Learning Assistant, supporting our ākonga across a range of learning areas. It's great to have them on board, and we look forward to the contributions they'll each make to our school whānau. Nau mai, haere mai.

Over the past month, our ākonga have been involved in a variety of meaningful learning experiences. Junior and senior students have taken part in the Numeracy and Literacy Common Assessment Activities (CAA), showing the progress they're making toward NCEA goals. One standout this term was Futureopoly, a hands-on event from the Graeme Dingle Foundation, where students connected with local employers and explored career ideas in a fun and practical way. Other events like the Careers Expo and Inspiring the Future gave our students the chance to meet with training providers and employers and see what might be possible in life beyond school. Science students had the opportunity to get out to Massey University for a STEM day, where they tried out different workshops and got a feel for learning at tertiary level. Trades and practical pathways were also front and centre, with some of our students visiting local employers through the MITO Automotive Bus Tour while a group of our wāhine also took part in Girls in Hi Viz, which introduced them to the world of infrastructure and construction. For our juniors, the Pathways to Potential programme gave them a first taste of what career exploration can look like. It's been great to see so many of our students making the most of these chances to learn, grow, and explore what might come next.

Earlier this year, we talked about our focus on improving student attendance, knowing that being at school every day makes a big difference to learning. It's been really encouraging to see improvements across many areas this term, especially among our Year 11 and 12 ākonga who have shown great commitment in turning up consistently. **Ka mau te wehi!** A huge thank you to our whānau for the support you've given from home. It's made a real impact. To our Year 13s, this is your final stretch at kura. It's your turn to set the standard—don't let your teina leave you behind. Keep showing up, keep leading, and finish strong.

As Term 2 draws to a close, I want to acknowledge the hard work, focus, and dedication our ākonga, kaiako, and whānau have brought to their learning. Progress comes from the small efforts made each day, and it's been uplifting to see our students making the most of the opportunities in front of them. We're proud of all that's been achieved so far and look forward to what the second half of the year will bring.









