Leading into Te Wiki o te Reo Māori, our kura has spent the term focusing on school-wide haka practice and building toward our House Kapa Haka Competition. Our school kapa haka rōpū will then step onto the Ahuriri Kapa Haka Festival stage. Kapa haka is a space our ākonga love to be part of, and it was awesome to see them supported by whānau this week. A special thank-you to Matua Parekura, Whaea Brenda, a Whaea Maraea and Whaea Nani—your steady guidance anchors our kapa haka and strengthens tikanga and te reo across the kura.

To everyone who sat benchmark exams and CAAs over the last two week—**ka mau te wehi!** Our kaiako have consistently commented on how seriously our ākonga prepared through Term 3. We're proud of the effort and look forward to celebrating results as they come through.

This term has felt like a montage of courage, curiosity, and contribution. In Rotorua, our 12/13 Physical Education (PE) crew slogged through the Tough Guy & Tough Girl course—mud-splattered smiles at the finish line and assessed credits (Level 2 and Level 3) earned the hard way. Back in Hawke's Bay, our boys' and girls' badminton teams fought for every rally at regionals, while 11 PE's "Amazing Race" stitched fitness to local identity, navigating across Ahuriri, ending at Mataruahou, with teamwork and grit.

At the same time, doors to the future have been opening. Career Navigator mock interviews turned nerves into confidence; Victoria and Massey's Wellington Open Days put tertiary options within reach; and Ignite Driving is quietly transforming L-plates into life skills. Through the Sport Hawke's Bay Student Council, student voice is shaping how sport looks and feels across our region.

Creativity and curiosity have had their moments in the spotlight too. The Year 12 Art Exhibition at Creative Arts Napier showed brave ideas and beautiful craft, while the Year 9 Science Roadshow at NBHS reignited wonder with hands-on exhibits and live shows that kept the korero rolling all the way home. Our international students, paired with local buddies, tasted the best of Heretaunga, deepening friendships and a sense of belonging. Finally, into active citizenship, the Electoral Commission sat with our 17–18-year-olds to demystify enrolment and voting, because showing up for each other, includes showing up for democracy.


